Dirty Dan absconds with Kangaroo Valley's Virgin. Pursued by angry townsfolk, the lovers leap from Hampden Bridge into Kangaroo River's raging icy torrent! Will they survive? Did the *actors* survive?? Gee ... hard to say they haven't been seen since ...
