A resident of Lake Conjola had to evacuate because of the fires. Her plan was to take her computer tower and external hard drive with her. Her home was destroyed. She lost her printer, mouse and keyboard plus various cables all of which we were able to replace.

Sue has taken several MacBooks to fire affected residents of Lake Conjola and further south to Cobargo.

A non member requested a computer for 10 weeks to use for about three hours a day running a school canteen. We provided one of the older MacBooks which was running Zorin Lite. You can Google "Flexischool" to see how parents can order online the child's lunch for the day, and the list of children and list of pies etc required that it produces.

Grandfather and granddaughter called at the shed requesting a computer capable of running Adobe Photoshop. We provided a tower and Lucas had an old copy of Photo Shop which he gave them. A drawing tablet was later received in a batch of recycling and it was also provided to the granddaughter.

We have received several Dell laptops and have been able to update them to Windows 10.

The Electronic Lounge was open each Friday during the Christmas / New Year period.

Sue had been in contact with some of the people in Cobargo and as a result she was taking 3 laptops and a quantity of printers for those who required them.

Recycling: A PC microphone and a tablet cover were on offer.

Recycling Lounge: There are several Mac books available.

Questions and Answers: How do you convert a Libra document to windows? Libre documents have their own file extension. To convert it you must change the extension to a windows extension such as .docx or .doc, this will then enable it to be read by someone with a windows based program. When you delete a file does it still take

up space?

Yes it does. It is stored in the recycle bin until the recycling bin is emptied. It is a good idea to empty the bin periodically to free up space. The bin gives you time to make sure you haven't deleted something by mistake in which case you can recover the file easily. There are programs available that can recover deleted files. It is also worth noting that when you delete an antivirus program by the uninstall program you may not remove it all completely. The best way is to access the antivirus web site and find their uninstall tool

What we did learn is that although the fire had passed there were trees still burning internally. Over a period of a few days the intensity built up until the tree literally blew up. The brigade was quickly on the scene and put the fire out.

One of our members was interested in phone systems for hearing impaired people and came across several apps that can aid the impaired. Captel was one of the most popular but are not compatible with NBN. There are several others such as Roger Voice and Pedius that convert voice to text '

An interesting You Tube item recommended by a member was 'Butterfly i q ". It demonstrates a hand held scanner which is similar to an ultrasound and is plugged in to a smart phone. It is able to scan all parts of the body and body functions.

David Proud is promoting a Be Connected program. Called "Living Connected" this program incorporates home visits for those unable to get out and about.

Meeting Held 25th February

Sue opened the meeting at 10am. The first topic for discussion was a type of computer on sale branded as "s mode". They are laptops that only let you download Microsoft products and the running system is a cut down version of windows 10. These laptops are cheaper than full versions but a good option for children as they can't download other programs.

Recycling Table: Some photo paper and a photo suite programme .

Electronic Lounge: There are still some mac books available.

Best Buys: Office works have a special on thumb drives at the moment. I purchased a pack of 3 16gb thumb drives \$16. Good value.

General Discussion: One of our members was having trouble with a program called "Screen Presso". This is a free program that enables you to capture a page or movie and share it. This is handy when a print facility or save is not possible. Simply get the picture on the screen and with the mouse adjust the area you want to copy and hit the left mouse button. You can then nominate where you want to save the item. There is also another program called Fireshot that does the same job.

Another topic that was discussed was the use of USB drives in cars as opposed to disc players. The problem was that many songs were downloaded but not all of them would play. This is because the car's system runs on a fat32 format and has a limit of 4gb for any one folder. To overcome this make separate folders and name them. Then you can put 4gb in each folder.

Another member asked about mp3gain.

Another member asked about mp3gain. This is a free program that adjusts mp3 files to enhance the music and maintain a level volume when played back. Someone brought up the problem of nuisance calls on mobiles and tablets. We found a program that is free and will prevent these calls by blocking them. The program is called "Hiyu". This is only for Apple products, however "True caller "and "Robo Killer" work for Android.

Identity fraud. A member drew our attention to lottery payouts. Apparently the lottery office ask you to sign up when you win a prize. You are asked all of the usual questions as well as your bank details, which I guess is normal if they want to deposit money into your account. However our member took the trouble to read the fine, fine print which gives the lottery office permission to give away your info to whomever they see fit.

Another interesting topic came up. A member bought a Telstra phone and then bought a sim card from a company that is supported by Telstra. The sim card didn't work. You can't use a sim card from Amysim, Aldi, Woollies etc even if they use Telstra or Optus as a carrier. You need an unlocked phone. Meeting ended 12.00 noon. Next meeting 10th March.
